

An explained guide for the highlight engine



In this illustration, we will showcase the different options of the highlight engine. For each option, we will illustrate its appearance on a Confluence page when enabled and when disabled.

This illustration guides **Confluence admins** through setting the general highlight engine while using Smart Terms for Confluence.

The highlight engine is split into 4 parts: Highlight engine, Sensitivity, Content and titles and Macros.

Highlight Engine


Auto highlight

Auto highlight



When the auto highlight is enabled, the terms in the Confluence page will automatically be highlighted.

Highlight on mouse hover




No need to click on the term to have the pop-up, just hover over it and you will see the full definition, related vocabulary, term's media, etc.

First term only

This means in a Confluence page where the same defined term is repeated multiple time, only the first term will be highlighted.

✓ Highlight substrings



As shown in the shared example, highlighting **substrings** could be helpful in use cases where a prefix or a suffix is defined.

Terms in titles can be highlighted, though the Confluence admin should keep in mind that this feature is not stable due to technical limitations.

Sensitivity

This is mostly used to avoid confusion between words with upper and lower case, where both words could have different meanings.

Diacritics sensitive

This is not thîs, thîs or thiş.

Diacritics sensitive

This could be thîs or thiş.

The default behavior of the “Diacritics sensitive” option is detecting similar words with or without diacritics and highlighting them.

Macros
